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## Overview of Camp of Dreams

- Camp of Dreams is a non-profit organization devoted to bringing *free*, year-round educational and cultural enrichment programs to underserved Chicago youth.
- Our *mission* is to prepare underprivileged young people to reach their full potential through the development of life skills, knowledge, and cultural enrichment.
- Camp of Dreams aims to make *deep and significant impact* on the lives of its participants: we are a small organization, serving 75 young people during the school-year and 55 young people over the summer, but we provide *sustained, intensive educational community* to everyone involved with the program.
- Camp of Dreams serves financially disadvantaged 9-15 year olds who are neither the highest statistical achievers nor the most “at-risk”—our goal is to serve the *solid but neglected core* of young people who have tremendous potential but extremely limited access to programs that will give them the attention and opportunities they deserve.
- Our *three-week overnight summer camp* revolves around small-group workshops in everything from entrepreneurship to creative writing to martial arts to wilderness skills to leadership development and team-building.
- Our *Community Days program*, which takes place two Saturdays a month during the school-year, brings our whole community together for workshops in community building, visual and performing arts, and educational fundamentals.
- Our *weekly tutoring*, like our Community Days program, takes place at LEARN Charter School in North Lawndale, and is, like all our programs, available to qualified applicants from all over the city of Chicago.
- Camp of Dreams has recently set in place a *leadership ladder* for its oldest participants, who have the opportunity to become Program Assistants, Counselors-in-Training, and Junior Counselors with our program as they move toward and into college.
- Camp of Dreams has quickly established itself among foundations and private donors as an innovative, cost-effective resource for underserved young people and families around Chicago. Camp of Dreams has only one full-time year-round staff member, yet in all our programs we maintain a 4:1 student to staff ratio.
- In all the activities we provide, from our Community Day workshops to our weekly after-school tutoring to our three-week overnight summer camp, Camp of Dreams seeks to build *confidence* by building the *skills* that justify such confidence. Underlying all of our programs is an emphasis on *accountability*, on following through with oneself and with others.

Dear Friend of Camp of Dreams:

In December of 2006, during the final Community Day gathering of our fall block, one of our instructors asked the Dreamers in her community-building class a few questions. Their answers go a good way toward describing the year just past.

To the question, "How has Camp of Dreams had an impact on your life?" one Dreamer said this: ***It brought me to a family.*** Here are a few of the other responses: *I've gotten to know new people; I've become a better team player; I've learned to work together; I've learned there are consequences to my actions.*

To the question, "What have you learned at Camp of Dreams?" our Dreamers said they had learned

- *How to cooperate with others*
- *How to stay fit and exercise*
- *How to paint faces*
- *How to make rockets*
- *How to survive in the forest*
- *How to light a fire*
- *How to dance*
- *How to draw without looking*
- *How to make a dream catcher*
- *How to put 12 people onto a box*
- *How to get along with people*
- *How to be more generous*
- *How to respect others*
- *How to pay more attention*
- *How to help others*
- *How to work with different types of people*

That our Dreamers said these things in December, five months after summer camp ended, speaks volumes about the ways in which our programming and our community continue to impact everyone involved. This ongoing impact is precisely what we're after, and we achieve it in a number of ways.

First, we make sure that our community continues to meet at least twice a month throughout the school-year. We left summer camp in late July, but campers, their families, our staff, and our board of directors gathered in Chicago in the middle of August for a Friends and Family Day that included Final Performances and a feast donated by our campers' families. By early September, our Saturday Community Days programming had begun at LEARN Charter School. Two Saturdays a month, we gather for small group workshops and classes in everything from creative writing to hip-hop dance to community-building to theatre. As of this writing, the Community Days program is in full swing, with 50-60 Dreamers attending every Saturday, camper families donating snacks, LEARN Charter School providing classrooms and gym space, and excellent teachers and volunteers making sure everything runs as it should.

The second way we achieve ongoing impact is less tangible but no less important: we strive in all of our programs to educate and engage the whole person. We want our Dreamers to become better students, and we want them to score higher on their tests, but this is far from all we want. We want them to discover new artistic tastes, to recognize themselves as leaders, to develop enduring friendships. And we believe that the more we succeed at engaging the whole person, the more likely is that grades and test scores will rise as well.

The third way we achieve ongoing impact is by continuing to bring the same campers and staff members together. We have run four summer camps and are halfway through our fourth school-year program, and we're enormously pleased to see that many of our original campers and staff members remain involved. Our five oldest campers were Counselors-in-Training this past summer; three of them have been with us since we started running programs in 2003, and the other two have been with us since 2004. This coming summer, we look forward to employing them as Junior Counselors and to being joined by our second group of Counselors-in-Training as well as our first group of Program Assistants.

We believe, in short, that our Dreamers make significant strides as individuals largely because they feel themselves to be important parts of a supportive, challenging, ongoing community. In 2006, the Camp of Dreams community has grown—and grown stronger—in all the ways we hoped it would as we entered the year.

As we begin 2007, we hope to strengthen our community yet further by increasing our roster of participants, providing our older participants with structured leadership opportunities, and continuing to work with highly qualified and committed teachers.

Our longer-term goals include: running two 4-day mini-camps, one in the fall (with each participant accompanied by a family member) and one in the spring; adding a week to our summer camp; and, within the next five years, taking significant steps toward owning our own camp facility.

In addition to our programming goals, we hope to continue to expand our funding base and our Board of Directors and to implement a comprehensive and meaningful evaluation process that helps us see what we do well and what we must improve. As of this writing we're rapidly moving forward with all of this.

Overall, 2006 was an extremely productive and hopeful year for Camp of Dreams. Thanks for being a part of this community and for helping make all of this possible.

EE's range of experience enables them to assess the needs of organizations, develop and implement appropriate solutions, and evaluate the results. Eric has more than ten years of teaching experience with 6th-12th graders at public, charter, and private schools. He also has fifteen years experience coaching basketball and soccer for youth ages 5-18 at schools and camps. Eric received his B.A. in Religious Studies from Lewis and Clark College and is currently pursuing his Masters Degree in Industrial/Organizational Psychology.

CHRIS HARPER graduated from the University of Pennsylvania, Wharton School of Business. At Penn, Chris was the captain of the men's varsity track team and became the only person in the Ivy League to win a race four consecutive years (outdoor 200m). After several years in corporate America and helping to start an elementary school Chris has started his own training and fitness company, Apex Training & Wellness, and a Subway sandwich franchise. Chris currently serves on the board of the Camp of Dreams and the auxiliary board for High Jump Chicago.

LOIS HAUSELMAN has spent the last twenty years as co-founder and executive editor of Other Voices, an award winning literary magazine housed at the UIC in Chicago. Previously, she was a script writer and film consultant with Lifestyle Productions. The company produced many short films, which included "Where Is Dead?" a short film dealing with death for children and adults which made its way into public and private schools and won a prestigious Cinema-Chicago Film award. She takes great pride in having been the first woman in 120 years to become president of the Anshe Emet Synagogue and equally values having been the Coach of the Anshe Emet Eagles Girls Softball Team for eighteen years. Though only 5'2" she has been married to the same man for forty years and has four children (one, a daughter-in-law), and in the next four months will

have two weddings and a baby (the daughter-in-law's). She writes short stories and paints large canvases and plays tennis as if she's tall.

ANN REARDON is a Senior Associate at Mercer Human Resource Consulting, a global leader for HR and related financial advice, products, and services. Prior to working with Mercer she worked as a consultant at Hewitt Associates. She also owned her own gourmet food store, the original Food Works on Armitage Ave. After graduating from the University of Illinois with a degree in education, she was a teacher and social worker. Her hobbies involve cooking, entertaining, being in the out-of-doors, exercising, gardening, and reading.

KIM WARREN is a Developmental Therapist, Doula, Lactation Specialist, and Pre-Natal Therapist. Her son, Ryan Starks, has been enrolled in the Camp of Dreams since the summer of 2004. Kim received her Bachelor's Degree from Western Illinois University in Child Development in 1996, and she will receive her Master's Degree in Addiction Studies in December of 2005. Kim engages in volunteer work with African refugees and babies with AIDS, among others.

CHRISTINE WATKINS operated a nonprofit consulting business for 20 years in Minneapolis and Chicago, working in the areas of program development, publications, and fundraising. Her clients included museums, libraries, schools and several national organizations, such as the American Library Association and the Constitutional Rights Foundation. Many of her projects focused on youth development and civic engagement. She received a degree in journalism from Northwestern University and a master's in public affairs from the University of Minnesota. ## Camp of Dreams 2006 Staff

The Camp of Dreams staff is extremely qualified and deeply committed to this work and brings a range of qualifications and perspectives to our programs: the staff includes a diverse mix of teachers, artists, professionals and university students. Camp of Dreams has one full-time staff member (Lori Coomes, the Director of Operations) and one part-time staff member (Adam Davis, the Executive Director), as well as 13 seasonal employees (for the summer camp) and approximately twenty volunteers or extremely part-time staff during the school-year.

The administrative staff of Camp of Dreams has been with the project since we began running programs, and much of the original staff remains involved.

- Lori Coomes, *Director of Operations*, joined Camp of Dreams for the 2004 summer camp, where she directed the Athletics Program and helped campers and staff out with everything else as well. Throughout the 2004-2005 school-year, Lori taught math and writing, and during the 2005 summer program, she led workshops in Mythology, Basketball, and Entrepreneurship, and she filled in wherever help was needed. Before becoming the Assistant Director at Camp of Dreams, Lori taught for four years in the Chicago Public Schools at Dvorak Specialty Academy and Ella Flag Young Elementary School. She also served as the assistant program coordinator for the Metro Achievement Center and coached soccer and basketball at the middle school level. Lori received her B.S. in Elementary Education from the University of New England.
- Adam Davis, *Executive Director*, is the founder and lead facilitator of “Justice Talking,” a reading and discussion series for Illinois AmeriCorps organizations that has been replicated, with the support of the National Endowment for the Humanities, in approximately fifteen states across the country. Davis is the co-editor, with Elizabeth Lynn, of *The Civically Engaged Reader*, an anthology of readings published by the Great Books Foundation in August 2006.
