Community Days: Creating Young Leaders

Our 2007-2008 Community Days program will finish up at the end of May having served the most students in Camp of Dreams history. Over 135 students participated in the twice-monthly meetings offered at LEARN Charter School in North Lawndale, engaging in a wide variety of academic and cultural enrichment activities. Highlights from the year include rap writing and performing, multi-cultural arts, creative writing and poetry, and theater arts.

Leadership classes were offered to all age groups during Community Days this year. The high school students have been participating in a year long leadership course offered by Educational Endeavors. This program fosters mentoring and teaching skills for the Dreamers to put to use during the summer camp experience and beyond.

Health Education classes were taught by over 50 volunteers from Rosalind Franklin University's Chicago Medical School. Classes covered topics such as the prevention of diabetes, CPR and first aid, nutrition and exercise, blood pressure and cholesterol, HIV, and substance abuse.

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
