Camp of Dreams
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Overview of Camp of Dreams

- Camp of Dreams is a non-profit organization devoted to bringing *free*, year-round educational and cultural enrichment programs to underserved Chicago youth, who are called “Dreamers.”
- Our *mission* is to prepare underprivileged young people to reach their full potential through the development of life skills, knowledge, and cultural enrichment.
- Camp of Dreams aims to make *deep and significant impact* on the lives of its participants: we are a small organization, serving 140 young people during the school-year and 56 young people over the summer, and we provide *sustained, intensive educational community* to everyone involved with the program.
- Camp of Dreams serves financially disadvantaged 8-18 year olds who are neither the highest statistical achievers nor the most “at-risk”—our goal is to serve the *solid but neglected core* of young people who have tremendous potential but extremely limited access to programs that will give them the attention and opportunities they deserve.
- Our *three-week overnight summer camp* revolves around small-group workshops in everything from entrepreneurship to creative writing to martial arts to wilderness skills to leadership development and team-building.
- Our *Community Days program*, which takes place two Saturdays a month during the school-year, brings our whole community together for workshops in community building, visual and performing arts, and educational fundamentals.
- High school Dreamers work their way up the *leadership ladder*, as they strive to be Counselors-in-Training and Junior Counselors at our summer camp, and they engage in substantive service and leadership activities during Community Days. They will also participate in a pilot Illinois College Tour in August of 2009.
- Camp of Dreams has quickly established itself among foundations and private donors as an innovative, cost-effective resource for underserved young people and families around Chicago. Camp of Dreams has only one full-time year-round staff member, yet in all our programs we maintain a 4:1 student to staff ratio.
- In all the activities we provide, from our Community Day workshops to our weekly after-school tutoring to our three-week overnight summer camp, Camp of Dreams seeks to build *confidence* by building the *skills* that justify such confidence. Underlying all of our programs is an emphasis on *accountability*, on following through with oneself and with others.

Dear Friend of Camp of Dreams:

2008 was a year of growth and change for Camp of Dreams. We finished the process of creating our first Strategic Plan, which is a 3-year look into the future of our programs and our sustainability. As part of that Strategic Plan, in 2008 we:

- ✚ hired our first full-time Executive Director, who was tasked with ensuring the fiscal and programmatic stability of Camp of Dreams;
- ✚ actively recruited new students into the Camp of Dreams programs;
- ✚ reached a number of active Dreamers that allowed us to break students into age-appropriate classes during Community Days;
- ✚ added new programs and refined long-standing programs to better reflect the lessons our Dreamers and their families need and want;
- ✚ met with our Dreamers 19 times on Saturdays for Community Days, for 3 summer weeks at overnight camp in Oregon, Illinois, and for our first community service weekend with 25 high school students;
- ✚ increased our corps of regular volunteers, including young people working for community service credit, to supplement our paid teaching staff;
- ✚ wished our two oldest Dreamers well as they left for college, and remained active in their lives as mentors;
- ✚ welcomed one of our oldest Dreamers into the cycle we hope will continue, which includes having Dreamers join our summer staff as counselors to younger Dreamers; and
- ✚ introduced the new high school curriculum with a weekend retreat that focused on academic success, college preparedness, leadership skills, and defining the Camp of Dreams high school program.

Most importantly, 2008 found our Dreamers and their families continuing to learn, love, excel and dream because of our programs. When asked about their time spent with Camp of Dreams, our Dreamers become our best spokespersons.

- ✚ I liked my leadership class because it "caused us to think deeply about what I thought and... allowed me to freely express my opinion"
- ✚ At camp, one Dreamer "learned how to deal with things better," while another "learned to depend on myself more"
- ✚ A mother gushes about her son's participation, saying: "this is the only thing that matters to him"

The Camp of Dreams staff, board members, volunteers and supporters do what we do for a myriad of personal reasons, but the one thing that draws us all together is our desire to improve the life of a child.

The goal of all of our programs is simple: when a child is actively engaged in learning new skills, that child will learn lessons to last a lifetime. Be it a lesson in communicating with peers, respecting one's surroundings, exploring new subjects, or a substantive lesson in an academic or cultural subject he or she never dreamed of – our Dreamers leave our program more mature and more aware of their own unlimited potential. A child who is confident is willing to try something new, to push the limits beyond what is expected, and to carve a niche in the world where he or she can have the greatest impact. Our objectives are simple, but not simplistic. *A confident child, a successful adult, an active community member.*

We accomplish this simple, but not simplistic set of objectives by creating a curriculum of programs that continues throughout the year – although our Dreamers may not be with Camp of Dreams every day, there is never a lull in the programs that might leave a Dreamer feeling as if he or she had lost their anchor. During the school-year, our full community meets every alternate Saturday for Community Days, where academics and community are the focus. Also during the school-year, our high-school Dreamers plan and provide 3 days of community service, and the projects range from eco-gardening public lands to culture-sharing with partner non-profit organizations. The summer time finds our Dreamers in the woods of Oregon, Illinois for 3 weeks, where they learn what it means to live in nature, in a communal setting, and away from their comfort zones. They learn that some things that seem scary might just be exciting and comforting: trying something new, allowing more people into their inner circle, reaching beyond imagined and sometimes real barriers.

The second way we achieve ongoing impact is less tangible but no less important: we strive in all of our programs to educate and engage the whole person. We want our Dreamers to become better students, and we want them to score higher on their tests, but this is far from all we want. We want them to discover new artistic tastes, to recognize themselves as leaders, to develop enduring friendships. And we believe that the more we succeed at engaging the whole person, the more likely is that grades and test scores will rise as well.

We believe, in short, that our Dreamers make significant strides as individuals largely because they feel themselves to be important parts of a supportive, challenging, ongoing community. In 2008, the Camp of Dreams community has grown—and grown stronger—in all the ways we hoped it would as we entered the year.

As we begin 2009, we hope to strengthen our community even further by increasing our roster of participants, providing our older participants with structured leadership and college preparedness opportunities, evaluating our program goals and outcomes, and continuing to work with highly qualified and committed teachers.

In addition to our programming goals, we hope to continue to expand our individual donor base and to implement a comprehensive and meaningful evaluation process with input from the entire community that helps us see what we do well and what we must improve. As of this writing we're rapidly moving forward with all of this.

Overall, 2008 was an extremely productive and hopeful year for Camp of Dreams. Thank you for being a part of this community and for helping make all of this possible.

ERIC DAVIS has designed, operated, and consulted on programs with public, charter, and private schools, non-profit organizations, camps, and community colleges. Eric's skills as a strategic coach and his ability to execute are most often applied to organizations in need of start-up, growth and turn-around. Eric refined his innovative approach to teaching and learning as founder and director of Educational Endeavors (www.educationalendeavors.org) and as founder and current board member of Camp of Dreams. He continues his pursuit of learning at international conferences, workshops, and through the daily interaction he enjoys with professionals dedicated to improving lives of youth and adults.

LOIS HAUSELMAN has spent the last twenty-three years as co-founder and executive editor of Other Voices, an award winning literary magazine housed at the UIC in Chicago. Previously, she was an account executive in an advertising firm in San Francisco and scriptwriter and film consultant with Lifestyle Productions in Chicago. The company produced many short films, which included "Where Is Dead?" a short film dealing with death for children and adults which made its way into public and private schools and won a prestigious Cinema-Chicago Film award. She takes great pride in having been the first woman in 120 years to become president of the Anshe Emet Synagogue and equally values having been the Coach of the Anshe Emet Eagles Girls Softball Team for eighteen years. Lori received her B.S. in Elementary Education from the University of New England.
